On June 6, 1944 more than 156,000 American, British and Canadian troops stormed 50 miles of Normandy's beaches in Northern France. Johnnie McCloud is one of those American heroes who lived through one of the fiercest battles in World War II. Read his story inside this edition of Parlor Talk.

An American Hero Lives Here

Mr. McCloud is a resident here at the Widows Home of Dayton. He came here following his 100th birthday and is approaching his 101st!

Mr. McCloud is a proud World War II veteran and will regale you with stories from when he served. He served as a Tech-5 in Company C, 331st Regiment of the 83rd Infantry Division (U.S. Army).

His tour of duty began April 1942 and he served until he was honorably discharged



in January of 1946. Throughout his military career, he was awarded a Bronze Star, American Theater Ribbon, European-African-Middle Eastern Theatre Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal, WWII Victory Medal, Combat Infantryman Medal Badge, and a bar for being a Marksman and Rifle Sharpshooter. His proudest accomplishment was being one of the first soldiers to land in Normandy, France and receiving the Battle and Confidence Award and the French Jubile de la Liberté medal. According to his nephew, Mr. McCloud not only survived D-Day, but he was also on a ship heading towards Japan when the war ended. (Thanks to the family for sharing his information.)
